Orofacial Pain Assessment: Classification, Biobehavior, QST, and Biomarkers

IADR – Seattle 2013 - To be held on Tuesday, March 19, 2013

Over the past 5 years, the Consortium has focussed on revising the RDC/TMD. Many symposia and workshops have been held, and the new DC/TMD has now been completed. A next goal is to expand the scope of the diagnostic criteria by including orofacial pain disorders. The published diagnostic criteria regarding orofacial pain disorders vary considerably, and consequently alignment of the diagnostic process and coverage of the breadth of orofacial pain disorders has not yet been obtained. Therefore, the derivation of diagnoses from different perspectives warrants further exploration and development. Hence, the aim of this workshop is to examine assessment of biobehavioral factors, classification methods, and putative mechanisms via biomarkers and QST.
